January 21 **Love that Sets Captives Free:** Martin Luther King's Theology of Love" **Pat Hanson**

We celebrate the Birthday of Martin Luther King, Jr. on the third Monday in January. As most are aware, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was part of a broad effort of like-minded folks, mostly people of color, working to dismantle segregation in the Jim Crow south. Using his own words and thoughts, many collected by Stanford University's The Martin Luther King, Jr. Research and Education Institute, we will explore how Dr. King's theology of Love was inextricable from his social action. (As the Institute asserts: "For Dr. King, the concept of agape [love] stood at the center of both his spiritual belief in a knowable God and his assertion that love and nonviolence were essential to remedying America's race problems. He defined agape as 'purely spontaneous, unmotivated, groundless, and creative. It is the love of God operating in the human heart". Join us as we get more familiar with Dr. King's potent theology of Love which still liberates, animates and activates justice nearly 60 years after his death.)

Pat Hanson provides psychotherapy for individuals, couples, and families at a licensed outpatient mental health clinic, New Day Resource.

January 28 "The Art of Awakening to Love" **James Neilson**

A visual presentation of classical and contemporary artwork addressing the theme of "liberating love" (as in one arising from the drowsiness and slumber of loneliness, isolation and anonymity by the promise of love). Unitarian Universalist congregations affirm and promote seven Principles, which we hold as strong values and moral guides. We live out these Principles within a "living tradition" of wisdom and spirituality, drawn from sources as diverse as science, poetry, scripture, and personal experience.

The Principles are not dogma or doctrine, but rather a guide for those of us who choose to join and participate in Unitarian Universalist religious communities.

1st Principle: The inherent worth and dignity of every person;

2nd Principle: Justice, equity and compassion in human relations;

<u>3rd Principle</u>: Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations;

4th Principle: A free and responsible search for truth and meaning;

<u>5th Principle</u>: The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large;

6th Principle: The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all;

7th Principle: Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.

Unitarian Universalists recognize our responsibility to reflect, learn and act how we may inadvertently contribute to racism In our community and beyond. In June at the 2020 Lakeshore UU Fellowship Annual meeting, we formally endorsed the following as our

<u>8th Principle:</u> "We affirm and promote journeying toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse multicultural Beloved Community by our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions."

We know that December was a busy month, so a reminder about name tags.

Last August I spoke at a Sunday service about issues related to LGBTQ communities, and attempted to make my case for including our preferred pronouns on our name tags (she, her, hers; they, them, theirs; he, him, his) in order to normalize the sharing of pronouns among folks in our gatherings. The link to my presentation is included below. At the conclusion of my talk I encouraged folks to ponder their decision before making one. As the new year approaches, I am hoping that people have, indeed, considered my proposal, and would like to have the pronouns added to

their name tags. This practice has become standard practice at UU Fellowships around the country, at its regional and national gatherings, and at gatherings of most conferences, conventions, and gatherings of organizations that embrace diversity.

Our name tags are made by Manitowoc Trophy, and cost \$6.50 each. If one prefers to keep their current tag and add a small tag attached at the bottom, the cost for the small attached tag is \$5.00 (They will attach it for you). If cost is an issue, please be aware that funds are available to pay for your tag (either option).

I encourage you to contact me or Manitowoc Trophy to place your order, indicating your preferred pronouns. If you contact them, refer to the Lakeshore Unitarian Universalist account, as they have the template for the badge stored. The store is located at 2402 Washington Street. When placing your order, it may be helpful to refer to the samples below which were produced by Manitowoc Trophy in January of 2023.

I'm hoping many will make this choice soon, so that as we begin the new year, we will have taken this small, but important step in our journey toward true inclusion and acceptance of all people who might visit or be a part of our community.




Great Decisions returns to the Manitowoc Public library Monday nights February 5 - March 25, 2024, Mondays, 6-8PM Balkansky Community Room
