"Belonging From and Indigenous Perspective" Norbert Hill & Kathleen Rattaree

From an Oneida Nation perspective, Hill will discuss citizenship and responsibility; tribal demography, the myth and reality of DNA and citizenship using Senator Elizabeth Warren as a catalyst for understanding. He will cover Indigenous Civics-values and governance of the Iroquois Confederacy. Kathleen Rattaree will discuss from a non-Native ally perspective. She will discuss the book creation and impact it has had on conversations. Although the idea for this book began in Oneida, Wisconsin, the final result spans the globe.

Norbert is the area director of education and training for the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin. His previous appointment was vice president of the College of Menominee Nation for their Green Bay campus. Norbert also served as executive director of the American Indian Graduate Center (AIGC) in New Mexico, a nonprofit organization providing funding for American Indians and Alaskan Natives to pursue graduate and professional degrees. Norbert resides on the Oneida reservation with his wife. (continued)

The seven principles are our covenant with the UUA; our covenant of right relations proceeds from the ideals those principles articulate and spells out the ways in which we promise to honor them. More on this to come.


Reflective Listening

Did you now? Refrigerators account for **1/6 of a home's energy use**. Opening the door accounts for between \$30 and \$60 of a typical family's electricity bill each year. Select energy-efficient models when buying replacements.

Did you know? Many idle electronics—TVs, DVD players, stereos, microwaves—use energy even when switched off to keep display clocks lit and remote controls working. Switch off power strips and unplug electrical devices when you're not using them.

Did you know? An average tree can absorb one ton of carbon dioxide over its lifetime. Plant a tree.



From World Water Day to Earth Day (March 22 to April 22),


Unitarian Universalists and other people of faith and conscience take action to build resistance to climate change and add our moral voices to the movement for climate justice.





Beauty Brigade Recycling Info -

The Haven now collects used personal care packaging to send in for reimbuement.

Accepted waste includes:

- 1. Hair care packaging such as shampoo bottles and caps, conditioner bottles and caps, hair gel tubes and caps, hair spray bottles and triggers, and hair paste plastic jars and caps.
- 2. Skin care packaging such as lip balm tubes, face soap dispensers and tubes, face lotion bottles, tubes, and plastic jars, body wash containers, soap tubes and dispensers, body lotion dispensers and bottles, shaving foam tubes (no cans), and hand lotion bottles and tubes.
- 3. Cosmetics packaging such as lipstick cases, lip gloss tubes, mascara tubes, eye shadow cases, bronzer cases, foundation packaging and bottles, powder cases, eyeliner cases, eyeliner pencils, eye shadow tubes, concealer tubes, concealer sticks, and lip liner pencils.
